	The second piece of business we're conducting tonight is the issuance of \$2.1 million in a note for the purpose of constructing a new water tank and demoing the 2 existing water tanks. That's moving right along. In effect, tonight we're going to borrow \$2,235,000. See that we pay the 62,000 on the outstanding note for the High Street real estate last April. In effect, when we complete the business this evening, we will end up with 2,819,000 of notes outstanding as of the transaction date of May 31. At the same time, I have to account for and keep everything on the straight and straight-on what the district's legislative body authorizes the debt.
Fran:	Ye-
Michael:	The 2nd set of accounting takes that into consideration. At the end of fiscal '15, we had 2,523,000 of debt authorized and unissued. We're going to burn that down 225 with a note and then we have an article at the district meeting to rescind the other 10,000 on that note. That's why that's shaded.
Fran:	Yes-
Michael:	When we complete the issuance end and vote it to district meeting, they will be authorized and unissued on the land restriction. Same is true for High Street real estate. We had 314, we issued 306 in notes and in fact, we've already paid down 62. We still have 8 that was never issued. We're going to rescind that at this annual district meeting. What's going to end up at June is we're still going to have the authority to borrow another \$180,000 for the security system within the water properties. As I've told you before, that's not adequate enough to do the work that the water department needs to do. They've done some preliminary work with the original 20,000 note that we issued last year. We believe that the grant component of the USDA package will be devoted towards allowing the district to complete that security project using federal money and our loan authority and then our loans will cover us the rest. We're hoping that we can get a grant to complete that water project and we may never need to issue that-
