

REPORT OF THE CLERK

COTUIT FIRE DISTRICT ANNUAL ELECTION AND DISTRICT MEETING MAY 25 AND 26, 1999

In accordance with the foregoing notice and the by-laws of the District, the annual election of the Cotuit Fire District was held at the Fire Station, 64 High Street, Cotuit, on Tuesday, May 25, 1999, between the hours of four o'clock and eight o'clock PM. The results were as follows:

Also in accordance with the foregoing notice and the by-laws of the District, the annual meeting of the Cotuit Fire District was held on Wednesday, May 26, 1999, at the Cotuit Elementary School, Old Oyster Road, at seven-thirty o'clock PM. The meeting was called to order by the Moderator. The Clerk read the call of the meeting and return of same. The following action was taken:

Article 1: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to accept the reports of the officers and committees of the District as printed.

Article 2: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to set the annual salaries of the elected officials as follows:

- a. Prudential Committee Members, Members of the Board of Fire Commissioners and Members of the Board of Water Commissioners: \$750.00 each.
 - b. Moderator: \$150.
- Article 3: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to raise and appropriate \$64,175.00 for the expenses of the Financial Department.
- Article 4: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to raise and appropriate \$87,758.00 for the Barnstable County Retirement Assessment.
- Article 5: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to raise and appropriate \$305,500.00 for notes and interest.
- Article 6: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to raise and appropriate \$30,000.00 for the purpose of lighting the streets of the District.
- Article 7: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to raise and appropriate \$6,000.00 for the maintenance of the Cotuit Library.
- Article 8: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to raise and appropriate \$89,775.00 for group insurance.
- Article 9: After reconsideration, and upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to raise and appropriate \$15,500.00 for the maintenance and operation of Freedom Hall and to appropriate and transfer \$30,000.00 from free cash in the treasury for repairs of Freedom Hall and to make it handicapped accessible.
- Article 10: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to raise and appropriate \$6,808.00 for the purpose of reimbursing the Town of Barnstable for services provided by the offices of the tax collector and assessors to collect the taxes of the District.
- Article 11: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to raise and appropriate \$682,808.00 for the labor and salaries of the Fire Department; and to raise and appropriate \$134,566.00 for the remaining expenses of the Fire Department, to be apportioned approximately as follows:
 - a. Maintenance, \$33,900.00
 - b. Operating expenses, \$99,416.00
 - c. Miscellaneous, \$1,250.00

for a total appropriation of \$817,374.00.

Article 12: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to appropriate and transfer \$4,000.00 from the ambulance replacement fund to provide for the ambulance service billing.

Article 13: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to appropriate and transfer \$7,700.00 from the ambulance replacement fund to provide for the purchase of patient medical supplies.

Article 14: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to appropriate and transfer \$19,000.00 from the ambulance replacement fund to provide for the replacement of the department's cardiac monitor in order to provide more advanced pre-hospital care; and to allow the Board of Fire Commissioners to trade or sell the existing unit, whichever is in the best interests of the District.

Article 15: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,200.00 to fund initial costs related to the hiring of additional part-time Call Firefighters to maintain the staffing level as set forth in policy by the Board of Fire Commissioners.

Article 16: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,880.00 to begin a firefighting hose and water supply equipment replacement program.

Article 17: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,000.00 to fund the second phase of a replacement program for protective clothing for firefighters.

Article 18: This article, to see if the District would vote to transfer from available funds to the Fire Department Labor and Salary account a sum of money to cover unforeseen emergency expenses which occurred during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1999, was indefinitely postponed.

Article 19: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to raise and appropriate:

- a: \$26,000.00 for the Water Department for service connections;
- b. \$166,432.00 for labor and salaries; and
- c. \$139,000.00 for the remaining expenses of the Water Department, to be appropriated approximately as follows:

\$43,000.00 for maintenance; \$88,000.00 operations; and \$8,000.00 for miscellaneous expenses

for a total appropriation of \$331,432.00; and that the receipts and revenues of the Water Department be applied to these amounts.

Article 20: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,000.00 for water main extensions.

Article 21: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for the continuation of the hydrant replacement program.

Article 22: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to raise and appropriate the sum \$25,000.00 to a reserve fund.

Article 23: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to appropriate and transfer \$45,000.00 from free cash in the Treasury toward the tax levy of the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1999.

Article 24: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to instruct the Prudential Committee to petition the Legislature to amend Section 5D of Chapter 328 of the Acts of 1926 as amended by Section 3 of Chapter 244 of the Acts of 1935, by striking out the words "not exceeding in the aggregate, one hundred and fifty thousand dollars,".

REPORT OF THE PRUDENTIAL COMMITTEE

TO THE CITIZENS OF THE COTUIT FIRE DISTRICT:

The Prudential Committee met all its statutory obligations under District by-laws, enabling acts of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and the mandates of the Annual District Meetings; and submits the following for our annual notes for fiscal year 1999.

As we approach the next century, it is appropriate to think about our direction. The build-out of all available residential lots in Cotuit is quickly approaching. Continued growth along Route 28 is restricting traffic throughout the year, not just the summer season. Issues of environmental concern appear on a daily basis.

As provided at the Annual District Meeting in 1998, a study was commenced to assist us in determining "who we are and where we are going." The results of that study are to be released in the fall of 1999 and should be the focus of discussions and meetings for some time to come.

The term "at a crossroad" is perhaps over-used. But we now have an opportunity to re-evaluate our own limited form of district governance, as well as our relationships with the Town of Barnstable and the other fire districts surrounding us.

With your help, the next century will be just as bright as the last for the Village of Cotuit.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF WATER COMMISSIONERS

To the Citizens of the Cotuit Fire District:

1999 proved to have one of the driest summers in years and a record June requiring over one million gallons of water per day for twenty-four days. With our new Station 5 on line since November, we were able to meet this requirement without difficulty. Unlike most water departments, Cotuit did not have to mandate restrictions. Nevertheless, we continue to support water conservation. Our water quality exceeds all State and Federal standards.

For the eighth year in a row, the Board has voted not to increase the water rates. Revenues continue to support our operations. Additional revenues are expected in FY 2000 in accordance with the Antenna Co-location Agreement entered into this year with Sprint.

There were no main extensions conducted this year, but one has been approved for Vineyard Road in the coming year.

Bay State Piping Company was awarded the bid for the installation of domestic services and emergency repairs for the coming year. Allied Painting Company of New Jersey was awarded the painting and rehab contract for the Main Street tank, which has been completed.

John Anderson retired from the Board in January 1999 after ten years of outstanding service to the District. John brought his many talents and ideas to the Water Department and was responsible for many innovations in our operations. Rick Kiely completed John's term and was subsequently elected as our newest Commissioner.

The Department authored its first water quality report. It is an excellent primer to understanding our Water Department and has been well received by the public. Additional copies of the report are available at the office.

Lastly, we ask that everyone be vigilant in the protection of our water resource. There are many potential sources of pollution that can damage this precious resource. In this way we can help ensure that Cotuit continues to enjoy the best quality water.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF FIRE COMMISSIONERS

TO THE CITIZENS OF THE COTUIT FIRE DISTRICT:

The Board of Fire Commissioners is pleased to submit our annual report for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1999.

As we prepare this last report of the century, it's hard not to reflect on the past. Your fire department has undergone many changes since the first fire engine was placed in service in 1916. Similarly, development of emergency care for those ill or injured has improved beyond what anyone may have dreamed of. What hasn't changed is our commitment to reducing personal suffering and loss, saving lives and property, and improving the quality of life in the village. We strive to maintain a high degree of professionalism and state of readiness.

EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES (EMS) - EMS accounts for about 60% of the service we provide. This year, we received funding to purchase two Automatic External Defibrillator (AED) units. These small, portable devices will improve our response by making available rapid cardiac defibrillation even if our ambulance is busy transporting a patient to the hospital. These units are similar to those being placed in service by major airlines, hotels and large businesses. We are scheduled to complete the training of our personnel in the use of these devices this winter. Funding obtained at the most recent annual meeting will further improve our service as we begin to implement 12 lead electrocardiogram (EKG) capability. EKGs can be sent by cellular phone to the receiving hospital in an effort to reduce the time it takes for physicians to diagnose and treat certain cardiac conditions.

Providing care for aging parents or those who are chronically ill can be very stressful and demanding, both physically and emotionally. We urge anyone in this type of situation to seek out resources and assistance. We can assist you with information on how you might make your home environment safer for everyone concerned and what you might do now to plan for emergencies should they occur.

FIRE PREVENTION - Inspection and prevention activities are a integral part of our nonemergency activity. Our activities, coordinated by Captain David Pierce, include performing inspections and issuing permits of various types. We also offer assistance to residents on any number of safety related issues. We are often reminded of the importance of smoke detectors in the home. Changes in requirements for new construction supports information that working smoke detectors can be the single most important life saving device in our home. We strongly recommend replacing smoke detectors when they become ten years of age or sooner if warranted. Depending on a detector's exposure to dust, moisture, cooking smoke and other environmental conditions, they can become unreliable. Battery or electric, all detectors should be checked and maintained regularly. Please contact us with any questions you have fire or life safety concerns.

Also of critical importance is the posting of your house number and access to your property. If your house number cannot be seen from the street, a number sign should be placed near the driveway or road entrance. Overhead limbs and brush encroaching on the driveway or private road may hinder our access. Again, we are happy to provide information on how to help insure adequate access to your property in case of an emergency.

PERSONNEL - We remain committed to utilizing full and part time (Call) personnel in our department. We strive to provide a quality service in the most cost efficient way possible. Our emergency response staff of nine full time personnel, including the Chief, and a part time staff of up to sixteen remains the same. Firefighters Donald Campbell, Jessica Bates, Richard Sahl and William McNamara completed their probationary period as Call Firefighters and remain active.

Like other "combination" departments, we find it challenging to sustain a full compliment of part time personnel. Changes in job requirements together family, personal and professional needs leave less time for some personnel to maintain their participation. Despite this, most of our personnel continue their service for many years; their perseverance is admired and greatly appreciated.

Full Time Firefighter/Paramedic Scott Bullock resigned to take a job closer to his family's home; Michael Judge, an ambitious Paramedic was hired from a list of well qualified applicants to fill the position. Jeff Gifford, a Call Firefighter/Senior Private with over twenty years experience, accepted a position as Driver/Operator. We conducted a Senior Private's examination with Call Firefighter William Sargent assuming the position left vacant by Jeff. Senior Privates assume a greater level of responsibility during daily operations and provide incident command as appropriate.

We appreciate the dedication of our full time and part time staff who work together in providing service. Cotuit remains one of the few communities that remain committed to maintaining a combination department.

TRAINING - Our personnel receive various types of training and education by attending local and regional training in fire and EMS related topics. Many members attend training at the Barnstable County Fire Academy or programs offered by the Massachusetts Firefighting Academy. Call Firefighter Dan Keane was sponsored by the department to attend Paramedic training. The personal time commitment required is substantial and we support Dan as he achieves his goal. Changes in the recertification of EMTs will require additional hours of ongoing training, an indication of the increasing level of knowledge required of this position.

APPARATUS AND EQUIPMENT - Our apparatus continues to receive ongoing maintenance and care. We are fortunate to have functional equipment with which to do our job. We want to again acknowledge FF/EMT Scott Fenner who provides the majority of our preventive and emergency maintenance.

We have begun to evaluate the condition of our 1969 brush breaker, scheduled for replacement in the near future. This process is being taken seriously as the availability of outside resources, current and future needs, costs, and other considerations are being weighed. Our brush breaker was purchased from the Town of Barnstable many years ago for one dollar when the Forest Fire Division was disbanded.

Recognizing the age and condition of our protective clothing, we implemented a replacement program to insure firefighter safety. We have also begun to evaluate and replace hose and other equipment purchased in the 1980's as part of our ongoing maintenance program and ISO requirements.

BUILDING AND GROUNDS - Funding was received last year to begin a program of ongoing interior and exterior maintenance. The building, renovated now ten years ago, has provided us with a functional environment. While on duty, Firefighter Mike VanEtten selects and maintains outside plantings contributing to the overall appearance of the station.

With concerns for improving our workplace environment and reducing health risks, we will be evaluating future improvements such as connecting our apparatus to direct ventilation to remove engine vapors. Environmental regulations will no doubt require us to take our floor drains out of service, alternatives for washing apparatus are being investigated.

ACTIVITIES - Once again, volunteers were recruited to put up Christmas lights at the village park near the library; this has become an annual event. The Firefighter's Association again sponsored the annual July 4 parade. Full time personnel collected money for Muscular Dystrophy with a "Fill The Boot" campaign. The Prudential Committee and Fire Commissioners continue to meet at the station monthly. District elections were again held at the station this year. We continue to provide blood pressure testing at the station, and at the Post Office the first Saturday of every month for your convenience. We offer information, directions, advice on safety issues, and general assistance in a variety of ways. Residents are encouraged to drop by the station or call 428-2210 with any questions.

COMMENTS - We want to thank the members of your fire and rescue department for their continued dedication and service. We would like to thank the Prudential Committee, Treasurer, Board of Water Commissioners and the employees of the Water Department for their continued support and cooperation. We look forward to the new century and the challenges we can expect ahead of us.




