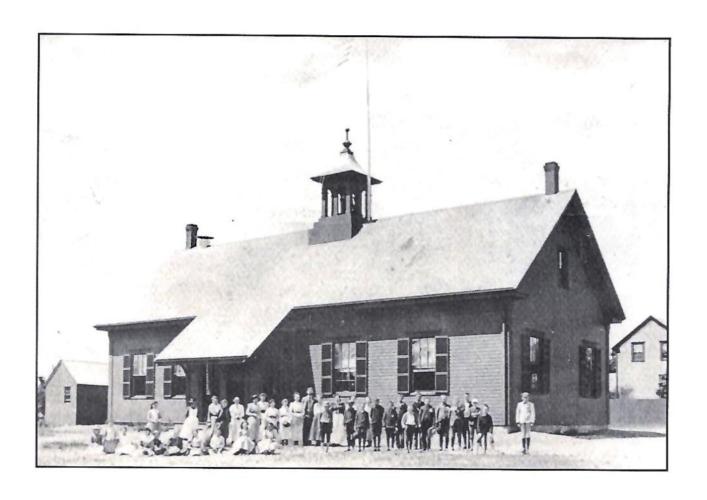

#### REPORT OF THE CLERK

## ANNUAL ELECTION AND DISTRICT MEETING MAY 25 AND 26, 2004

In accordance with the foregoing notice and the by-laws of the District, the annual election of the Cotuit Fire District was held at the fire station, 64 High Street, Cotuit, on Tuesday, May 25, 2004, between the hours of four o'clock and eight o'clock PM. The results were as follows:

Also in accordance with the foregoing notice and the by-laws of the District, the annual meeting of the Cotuit Fire District was held Wednesday, May 26<sup>th</sup>, 2004, at Freedom Hall Main Street, Cotuit, at seven-forty o'clock PM. The meeting was called to order by the Moderator. The Clerk read the call of the meeting and return of same. Mimi McConnell and Patrick Catalano were appointed and sworn in as tellers. The following action was taken.

- Article 1: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was voted to accept the reports of the officers and committees of the District as printed. (Unanimous)
- Article 2: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was voted to set the annual salaries of the elected officials as follows: Prudential Committee Members, Members of the Board of Fire Commissioners and Members of the Board of Water Commissioners: \$1,250.00 each; Moderator: \$250.00. (Unanimous)
- Article 3: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was voted to raise and appropriate \$91,200.00 for the expenses of the Financial Department. (Unanimous)
- Article 4: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was voted to raise and appropriate \$111,397.00 for the Barnstable County Retirement Assessment. (Unanimous)
- Article 5: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was voted to raise and appropriate \$67,350.00 for notes and interest. (Unanimous)
- Article 6: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was voted to raise and appropriate \$25,000.00 to maintain the street lights of the District. (Passed)
- Article 7: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was voted to raise and appropriate \$7,500.00 for the maintenance of the Cotuit Library. (Passed)
- Article 8: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was voted raise and appropriate \$244,350.00 for group insurance. (67 in favor, 17 opposed)
- Article 9: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was voted to raise and appropriate \$18,500.00 for the maintenance and operation of Freedom Hall. (Passed)
- Article 10: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was voted to raise and appropriate \$6,808.00 for the purpose of reimbursing the Town of Barnstable for services provided by the offices of the tax collector and assessors to collect the taxes of the District. (Unanimous)
- Article 11: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was voted to raise and appropriate \$890,542.00 for the labor and salaries of the Fire Department; and to raise and appropriate \$207,451.00 for the remaining expenses of the Fire Department, to be appropriated as follows: Maintenance, \$47,521.00; Operating expenses, \$158,680.00; and Miscellaneous, \$1,250.00, for a total appropriation of \$1,097,993.00 (Passed)
- Article 12: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was voted to appropriate and transfer \$7,500.00 from the Fire Department capital equipment account to provide for the ambulance service billing. (Unanimous)

Article 13: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was voted to appropriate and transfer \$12,500.00 from the Fire Department capital equipment account to provide for the purchase of patient medical supplies. (Unanimous)

Article 14: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was voted to or appropriate and transfer from the Fire Department capital equipment account the sum of \$30,000.00 to improve radio/pager communications used to alert and summon personnel for emergency response. (Unanimous)

Article 15: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,500.00 to fund expenses associated with the initial hiring of new Call Firefighters, or take any other action.. (Unanimous)

Article 16: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,500.00 to fund the purchase of a washer/extractor to maintain firefighter protective clothing and related items. (Unanimous)

Article 17: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,600.00 to provide ten percent matching funds in the event the department is successful in obtaining grant money as applied for under the 2004 Assistance to Firefighters Grant Program created by the Federal Fire Act of 2001. (Unanimous)

Article 18: Upon motion duly made and seconded, this article, 'To see if the District will vote to change wording in Article 16 of the May 28, 2003, annual district meeting by replacing the word 'firefighter' with the word 'staff position.'" was indefinitely postponed. (Unanimous)

Article 19: Upon motion duly made and seconded, this article, "To see if the District will vote to appropriate and transfer from available funds a sum of money to the current Fire Department operating budget to cover unforeseen emergency expenses which occurred during the fiscal year ending June 30, 2004." was indefinitely postponed. (Unanimous)

Article 20: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was voted to raise and appropriate: \$26,000.00 for the Water Department for service connections; \$209,642.00 for labor and salaries; and \$188,200.00 for the remaining expenses of the Water Department, to be apportioned approximately as follows: \$53,000.00 for maintenance; \$113,200.00 for operations; and \$22,000.00 for miscellaneous expenses for a total appropriation of \$423,842.00 and that the receipts and revenues of the Water Department be applied to these amounts. (Unanimous)

Article 21: Upon motion duly made, seconded and amended, this article, "To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate, borrow and appropriate, or appropriate and transfer from available funds the sum of \$1,250,000.00 for the construction of a 500,000 gallon water storage tank." was indefinitely postponed. (37 in favor, 20 opposed)

Article 22: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$26,000.00 for the purchase of one new four-wheel drive truck with accessories to replace the existing 1996 two-wheel drive Ford Ranger. (Unanimous)

Article 23: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 for the water main extension program. (Unanimous)

Article 24: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 for the continuation of the hydrant replacement program. (Unanimous)

Article 25: Upon motion duly made, seconded and amended, it was voted to amend Article VIII of the bylaws of the District to include the following section as it relates to union negotiations:

"Article VIII, Section 10: Union negotiations will be carried out with representation from the district consisting of two (2) members from the Fire Commissioners and one (1) member from the Prudential Committee, in each event to be appointed by the Chairmen of the respective committees.

"Anyone who employed by the district, full or part time, or related to an employee of the district shall be deemed ineligible to serve as a negotiator for the District in any negotiations with the Union. For the purposes of this paragraph, 'related to an employee' shall refer to spouse, parents, siblings and children of firefighters only."

(Unanimous)

Article 26: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,000.00 for the Stabilization Fund as provided under Section 5B, Chapter 40, of the General Laws of the appropriate a sum of money to a reserve fund. (Unanimous)

Article 27: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000.00 to a reserve fund. (Unanimous)

Article 28: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was voted to appropriate and transfer the sum of \$125,000.00 from free cash in the Treasury toward the tax levy of the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2004. (Unanimous)

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#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF FIRE COMMISSIONERS

#### TO THE CITIZENS OF THE COTUIT FIRE DISTRICT:

The Board of Fire Commissioners is pleased to submit our annual report for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2004.

#### **EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES (EMS)**

Providing Emergency Medical Services has been a part of our department's services since the 1950's. This year, the Cape and Islands EMS System (CIEMSS) celebrated their 30<sup>th</sup> birthday. Founded in 1974, CIEMSS is a non-profit agency charged with overseeing training, certification, administration and other functions related to EMS across the Cape. From the early years when radios were first installed in ambulances to communicate with hospitals to our present ability to transmit 12 lead EKG information, Cape Cod has been on the leading edge of providing EMS service.

With almost yearly changes to medical protocols authorized by the State, we continue to improve our basic and advanced life support service. Obtaining 12 lead EKG data has become part of our standard of care since its implementation two years ago. Our partnership with Cape Cod Healthcare allows us to provide some of the best pre hospital and in hospital care of patients with cardiac symptoms available. We urge residents not to delay in calling us for help when appropriate as treatment success depends on early intervention.

As health care providers, we must comply with HIPAA regulations regarding the privacy of patient information. Our personnel have received the required training and our procedures are in compliance with the law. Patient privacy has always been maintained by department procedure and practice even before HIPAA regulations became effective. We hope residents are taking advantage of our "File For Life" program. Using a standard form, medical information is stored in a red pouch affixed to your refrigerator with a magnetic backing. Having medical information available allows us to provide better initial care.

We want to acknowledge our Emergency Medical Technicians and Paramedics who continue to perform with compassion and dedication. Our full time staff and Call Firefighters perform fire suppression, EMS, and related functions; this "dual role" ability allows us to manage a wide range of emergency situations.

#### FIRE PREVENTION

Our state mandated responsibility for code enforcement, together with our inspection and prevention activities remains an important part of our activities. We inspect business properties for Town licenses and overall fire and life safety conditions yearly. We continue to work with the other Districts to staff the inspectional services building at 200 Main Street in Hyannis. Each District provides a fire prevention staff member on a rotating basis during morning business hours. This ongoing partnership with the Town has improved relations and enhanced the flow of information between our Districts and the Town.

We urge residents to install smoke detectors if you do not have already have them in your home. Smoke detectors should be tested regularly and replaced every 10 years or less, even if they appear to work properly due to their exposure to airborne dust and moisture. If you have concerns about a detector's ability to function properly we can provide a simple test to determine if it's working properly; we offer this service free of charge.

Please post your house number! If your house number can't be seen from the street, a number sign should be placed near the driveway or road entrance. It's important to check the visibility of your house number and trim back any foliage that might obstruct it from view. If you have detached structures such as a guest cottage or other habitable building on your property, a separate house number may be necessary. Without a separate number assignment, delays can occur especially if there is a separate phone number or if a call is placed from a cordless phone from another building. We can provide you with specific information in accordance with the Town's by laws for house numbering.

Access to properties continues to be an ongoing challenge. Tree limbs and brush overhanging driveways or private roads can delay or prevent us from reaching your home quickly not to mention the damage they cause to our apparatus. Our fire apparatus is larger and wider than the average vehicle and requires more room. We can furnish information on how to provide adequate access to your property.

If you have a fire and/or medical alarm, live alone or live away part of the year, you may want to consider using a "lock box". Lock boxes securely store keys to your property for responders to use in an emergency. Information is available at the fire station. Residents with fire and/or medical alarms are also urged to update information with us regarding local key holder numbers and other information.

#### **PUBLIC FIRE & SAFETY EDUCATION**

In recent years, we have been reporting on the work being done to provide education to the community on fire and safety issues. Firefighter/EMT William "Bill" McNamara continues to lead our school education program. Life safety education is provided to students at the Cotuit Elementary school and day care centers in Cotuit. Visits to the fire station, tours of the Fire Safety House and other programs bring safety information to children in a fun and interesting way.

We talk about ice safety at a yearly demonstration at the Cotuit Elementary school to provide children and their parents with information on this potential danger. State mandated fire drills are conducted to insure both children and staff know how to safely evacuate the school in an emergency. We encourage the use of bicycle helmets and provide safety information and free helmets to those who need them.

Last year, we worked with Barnstable County and other agencies to develop a publication with information on what to do before, during and after various natural disasters. The "Cape Cod Emergency Preparedness Handbook" was published with grant funds from the Federal Emergency Management Agency. Copies are available at the fire station free of charge for all residents and visitors.

#### PERSONNEL

We continue to employ full and part time personnel to provide 24 hour service. Working in shifts of two, eight full time personnel staff the station 24 hours a day. Beginning in the fall of 2004, we will add a full time Firefighter/EMT position to work daytimes during the week. The Chief works daytimes during the week and Call Firefighters provide additional coverage on weekend days which afford them opportunities for added experience.

Having a combination department has allowed us to provide a quality service in the most cost efficient way possible. We continue to rely on off duty full time and part time personnel to provide additional help for many incidents. Our initial response typically consists of the full time staff on duty with call back of off duty full time and part time personnel if they are available. We attempt to maintain two personnel for standby while apparatus is committed on scene or during patient transport should a subsequent incident occur.

In recent years, we have not been able to hire sufficient numbers of part time personnel to maintain an adequate roster. About 1 out of 10 applicants complete the hiring and initial training process. We regularly loose call personnel to full time positions with other fire departments, some during their first year of employment. We compete for the availability of our part time personnel as they juggle personal, work and family commitments. We have seen these challenges become the norm and expect it to be no different in the future.

Regarding full time personnel, there are few jobs we know of that rely on their staff to return to work on an emergency basis once they have completed their scheduled weekly hours. Busy periods require more call back resulting in necessary overtime expenses for responses to emergency incidents and standby. Full time personnel often work many additional hours providing shift coverage to insure minimum staffing needs are met. With the exception of the additional day coverage position, full time staffing has remained unchanged for 10 years.

Our present system of operation uses a minimal number on duty personnel to provide a prompt initial response. Many incidents may require additional help to provide an adequate level of service. The severity and duration of an initial incident or the occurrence of a subsequent incident further stretches our available resources. While assistance from other departments is an option, it is not appropriate to request on a routine basis and can be unreliable if activity levels are high throughout the area.

Given these concerns, it is likely that our staffing will have to be increased in the near future or sooner. Though discussions are ongoing to find solutions, few options exist beyond hiring additional full time personnel. We are not alone however as other departments, full time and combination, experience the same challenges and concerns we have expressed here.

We want to acknowledge the dedication and professionalism of our full time and part time staff who work together in providing service. A listing of fire department members as of June 30, 2004 is provided after the narrative portion of this report.

#### TRAINING

Training and education remains an important part of our organization. Senior Private Stephen Hoffman continues to coordinate our training activities. Sr. Pvt. Hoffman most recently completed a course at the National Fire Academy in training program management. We train on a regular basis in all areas of fire, rescue and EMS. Department training includes yearly exercises at the Barnstable County Fire Training Academy under simulated fire conditions. Each year, we build upon existing skills and introduce new topics to retain a level of proficiency.

Training activities also include training and orienting new Call Firefighters to their positions, a process that takes up most of their first and second years on the job. State and federal law mandates we review certain material such as responding to hazardous materials incidents, incident command and certain EMS related training. The recertification of all personnel at their respective levels of EMS training is ongoing through various mandatory and elective courses.

#### APPARATUS AND EQUIPMENT

We continue to perform preventive maintenance on all our vehicles in addition to making repairs as necessary. We can anticipate vehicles will require more service as they age:

preventive maintenance helps to reduce the extent of repairs in some cases however. Looking ahead, the scheduled replacement of our Fire Chief's vehicle, ambulance and service vehicle are planned in the next few years.

We completed replacement of our protective clothing and will install a washer/extractor approved at the annual meeting to help maintain them over time.

We completed installation of our Self Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA) refilling station provided by a \$42,000 from the Federal Assistance to Firefighter's grant program. SCBA units are worn by firefighters when they enter hazardous atmospheres and are critical to firefighting and other operations where clean breathing air is necessary. As part of the same grant, we were able to replace our SCBA cylinders, whose mandated service life was nearing completion.

We are evaluating our communications and paging system. The increased use of electronic appliances and equipment in homes has a detrimental effect on the "low band" frequency we use. Options are being explored to resolve issues with the reliability of reaching all our personnel to alert them to respond to incidents.

The Cotuit Firefighter's Association has initiated a fund raising campaign to purchase and donate a new rescue boat to replace the existing boat purchased in the late 1980's. We are grateful to the Association for their fund raising efforts and past donations of equipment to the department. Your generous support of the Cotuit Firefighter's Association through your donations is greatly appreciated.

#### BUILDING AND GROUNDS

We completed installation of the vehicle exhaust system funded last year. The system eliminates the intrusion of vehicle exhaust into occupied areas reducing our employees' exposure to harmful vehicle emissions. We will be looking closely at preventive maintenance items and plan to incorporate repairs and replacements of building systems and fixtures as necessary and appropriate in the coming years.

#### ACTIVITIES

Once again, we participated in the annual Kids Day in Hyannis sponsored by the Barnstable Police Department and the other Fire Departments. Department members once again brought Santa Clause by boat to the town dock for the annual Christmas in Cotuit event.

The Cotuit Firefighter's Association provided assistance to the Civic Association for the annual July 4 parade. We want to thank members who have made their time available to represent the department at these and other special events. The Prudential Committee and Fire Commissioners continue to meet at the station monthly. District elections were held at the station again this year.

We are happy to continue providing blood pressure screening at the station with hundreds of residents coming in each year. We are pleased so many people have taken advantage of this free service offered anytime at the fire station, and at the Post Office the first Saturday of each month. We continue to offer information, directions, advice on safety issues, and assistance in a variety of ways to our residents and visitors. Residents are always encouraged to drop by the station or call 428-2210 with questions, suggestions, or concerns.

#### COMMENTS

We offer our appreciation and thanks to the members of your fire and rescue department for their ongoing efforts to provide service to our community. We would like to thank the Prudential Committee, Treasurer, Clerk, Board of Water Commissioners and the employees of the Water Department for their continued cooperation and support.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF WATER COMMISSIONERS

#### To the Citizens of the Cotuit Fire District

FY 2004 went as fast as it came. We continued to provide the highest quality of water to our customers, and our facilities operated efficiently with relatively low maintenance.

Bortolotti Construction was awarded the bid for installation of domestic services and emergency repairs. They twenty-two new services and eleven replacement services, and repaired several water lines. Three domestic services froze because of the severe winter weather and had to be repaired. Several meters also froze and had to be replaced.

T-Mobile finished their antenna installation at the Main Street tank in September. We now receive more than \$77,000 annually from our antenna lease program.

Station #2 was put back on line in March, when MTBE testing consistently showed nearly non-existent levels.

The engineering firm of Stearns & Wheler conducted a study to determine the best location for a new water storage tank. A warrant article, asking for \$1,250,000 to construct tank, was indefinitely postponed at the May District Meeting. Site studies continue.

The Department of Environmental protection required the Department to begin testing for perchlorate, a component of propellants in rockets, missiles and fireworks. Initial tests were conducted in April and no levels were detected. Further testing will be done.

"No Trespassing" signs were posted in the watershed to try to curtail the destruction that has taken place on Sampsons Mill Road and around the pumping stations. Gates have been ordered for future installation. The Barnstable Police were notified about the new signs.

Consumer confidence reports were sent out to each customer in June. These reports provide information about your water quality, state facts about daily water consumption

and offer conservation tips. Additional copies are available at the Water Department's office.

We extend our personal thanks to the staff for another year well done. Their waterworks experience keep our day-to-day operations running smoothly.
