

## REPORT OF THE CLERK

# ANNUAL ELECTION AND DISTRICT MEETING MAY 29 AND 30, 2007

In accordance with the foregoing notice and the by-laws of the District, the annual election of the Cotuit Fire District was held at the fire station, 64 High Street, Cotuit, on Tuesday, May 29, 2007, between the hours of four o'clock and eight o'clock PM. The results were as follows:

Also in accordance with the foregoing notice and the bylaws of the District, the annual meeting of the Cotuit Fire District was held Wednesday, May 30, 2007, at Freedom Hall, Main Street, Cotuit, at seven-thirty o'clock PM. The meeting was called to order by the Moderator. The Clerk read the call of the meeting and return of same. The tellers were appointed and sworn in. The following action was taken.

- Article 1: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to accept the reports of the officers and committees of the District as printed.
- Article 2: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to set the annual salaries of the elected officials as follows:

Prudential Committee Members, Members of the Board of Fire Commissioners and Members of the Board of Water Commissioners: \$1,250.00 each; Moderator: \$250.00.

- Article 3: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to raise and appropriate \$96,200.00 for the expenses of the Financial Department.
- Article 4: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to raise and appropriate \$154,843.00 for the Barnstable County Retirement Assessment.
- Article 5: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to raise and appropriate \$57,805.00 for notes and interest.
- Article 6: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to raise and appropriate \$28,000.00 to maintain the street lights of the District.
- Article 7: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to raise and appropriate \$12,000.00 to support the operation of the Cotuit Library .
- Article 8: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to raise and appropriate \$325,294.00 for group insurance.
- Article 9: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to raise and appropriate \$25,000.00 for the maintenance and operation of Freedom Hall.
- Article 10: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to raise and appropriate \$6,808.00 for the purpose of reimbursing the Town of Barnstable for services provided by the offices of the tax collector and assessors to collect the taxes of the District.

Article 11: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to raise and appropriate \$1,104,751.00 for the labor and salaries of the Fire Department; and to raise and appropriate \$227,055.00 for the remaining expenses of the Fire Department, to be apportioned approximately as follows:

Maintenance, \$48,300.00
Operating expenses, \$177,755.00 and
Miscellaneous, \$1,000.00
for a total appropriation of \$1,331,806.00

- Article 12: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to appropriate and transfer \$6,750.00 from the Fire Department capital equipment account to provide for the ambulance service billing.
- Article 13: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to appropriate and transfer \$22,500.00 from the Fire Department capital equipment account to provide for the purchase of patient medical supplies and related equipment for the operation of the ambulance.
- <u>Article 14</u>: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,600.00 to fund expenses associated with the initial hiring of new Call Firefighters.
- Article 15 Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to appropriate and transfer from the Fire Department capital equipment account the sum of \$50,000.00 to replace the department's Self Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA).
- Article 16: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to appropriate and transfer from the Fire Department capital equipment account the sum of \$4,500.00 to purchase rescue air bags.
- Article 17: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to appropriate and transfer from the Fire Department capital equipment account the sum of \$38,500.00 to put into operation an Advanced Life Support Engine utilizing existing apparatus and purchasing necessary EMS equipment.
- Article 18: This article to see if the District will vote to appropriate and transfer from available funds a sum of

money to the current Fire Department operating budget to cover unforeseen emergency expenses which occurred during the fiscal year ending June 30, 2007 was indefinitely postponed.

Article 19: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was
unanimously voted to raise and appropriate:

\$28,000.00 for the Water Department for service connections

\$247,647.00 for labor and salaries; and

\$282,400.00 for the remaining expenses of the Water Department, to be apportioned approximately as follows:

\$75,000.00 for maintenance; \$155,400.00 for operations;

and \$52,000.00 for miscellaneous expenses

for a total appropriation of \$558,047.00 and that the receipts and revenues of the Water Department be applied to these amounts.

Article 20: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,600.00 and transfer and appropriate from the Basic Use account the sum of \$24,400.00 for a total appropriation of \$50,000.00 for the water main extension/replacement program.

Article 21: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to raise and appropriate sum of \$25,000.00 for the pump replacement/well treatment program.

Article 22: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,000.00 for the meter replacement program.

Article 23: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 to appraise, evaluate and make recommendations regarding the potential future uses of the property located at 140 Old Oyster Road for the Cotuit Fire District.

Article 24: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to amend Article XI, Section 2 of the Bylaws of the District by substituting for the existing language the following: "All contracts for the purpose of installation of equipment, supplies or material on behalf of any board or committee shall be awarded, and associated

documentation maintained, in a manner consistent with the requirements of M.G.L. CH. 30B, Section 3 et Seq."

Article 25: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to transfer and appropriate the unexpended balance of \$19,929.05 from Article 16 voted at the annual meeting held on May 29, 1996 to be expended under the direction of the Prudential Committee for painting and repairs to Freedom Hall.

<u>Article 26</u>: This article to see if the District will vote to accept G.L. Ch. 40 S.5F which explicitly provides for the establishment of a separate account for ambulance receipts was withdrawn.

Article 27: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was voted by a majority to raise and appropriate \$25,000.00 for the Stabilization Fund as provided under Section 5B, Chapter 40, of the General Laws.

Article 28: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to raise and appropriate \$50,000.00 to the reserve fund as provided under Section 5C, Chapter 40 of the General Laws.

Article 29: Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to appropriate and transfer \$200,000.00 from free cash in the Treasury toward the tax levy of the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2007.



## Report of the Prudential Committee

The Prudential Committee of the Cotuit Fire District herewith submits its annual report for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2007.

Your Prudential Committee consists of three elected members and is responsible for the lighting of the streets and public ways of the district and the maintenance and repairs for Freedom Hall.

We are also responsible for the inclusion of the budgets and articles in the warrant for the Annual District Meeting and make recommendations regarding those budgets and articles at that meeting held in May of each year.

The Prudential Committee meets monthly for the purpose of insuring that funds raised by the district are expended in a fiscally responsible way and for the purpose prescribed by the district voters. The date and time of each monthly meeting are posted on the bulletin board at the post office and at the district office located in the fire station or by calling the district office at 508-420-3000.

The Cotuit District office is currently located at the Fire Station and is open for your convenience on Tuesdays and Thursdays fom 9:30 to 12:00. In addition, Mrs Murray checks the answering machine on a daily basis for messages needing a response.

As part of the maintenance of Freedom Hall, ongoing maintenance of the main floors and lighting improvement have been undertaken. We requested funding and received approval at the last district meeting for the purpose of the much needed painting of the interior of the hall.

Your Prudential Committee serves you the taxpayer and urges any of you to attend any of our open meetings held each month in order to be a better informed citizen of our Cape Cod village.

Cotuit is no different from other villages, cities or towns when you consider attendance and voting at various meetings. However, as chairman of the

Prudential Committee, I encourage you to attend our annual district meeting and vote. Consider that out of 2000 eligible voters only 80 to 100 attend our annual district meeting held each May. Since most articles on the warrant require a majority vote, this means than 40 to 50 people control raising taxes and spending your tax dollars in Cotuit. Only you can change that and I hope to see you next May making your vote count as much as the taxes you pay.

#### Report of the Board of Water Commissioners

To the Citizens of the Cotuit Fire District:

In FY 2007, the Cotuit Water Department delivered 211,593,000 gallons of drinking water to 2,139 homes, businesses and public buildings.

The water quality is analyzed on a monthly basis and water quality continues to exceed all state and federal standards and the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) found no areas needing attention, nor any violations of regulations.

Mr. Ken Ventura retired as department superintendent. Assistant superintendent Chris Wiseman, a longtime member of the department, was appointed to the superintendent position. A new operator was added to the staff.

Tata & Howard engineers prepared and submitted an application to the DEP to raise the permitted amount so the District will not continually be in violation of the regulations. The new withdrawal permit should be issued in early 2008.

The Board continued working with the engineering firm of Weston & Sampson to find a practical replacement for the aging Main Street storage tank.

The Board of Water Commissioners continued to work in opposition of a dense development project proposed for Main Street. This development is not allowed under current Barnstable zoning laws however there is an exceptions to the regulations that would allow the developer to build the sewage discharge dangerously close to a drinking water supply well. The board has notified the Town that it has strong opposition to allow this type of dense development within the supply zones of the wells.

One large housing development, located on Route 28, was approved by the Town and is now under construction. Approximately 120 new homes will be added to the water system when the project is built out. The department is monitoring the construction of the water distribution and waste water systems throughout the project.

Drinking Water Quality Reports were sent to every home in the District and additional copies are available at the Water Department office.

Throughout the past year the Water Department, with a new superintendent and an additional operator handled the workload in a very thorough and professional manner in all areas of maintenance and operations of the water supply system.

# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF FIRE COMMISSIONERS

#### TO THE CITIZENS OF THE COTUIT FIRE DISTRICT:

The Board of Fire Commissioners is pleased to submit our annual report for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2007.

#### **EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES (EMS)**

EMS continues to account for over half of our incident activity. We continue to provide service at the Advanced Life Support (ALS) level. All of our personnel are trained at either the EMT-Basic or EMT-Paramedic level in addition to their duties as Firefighters. By the time this report reaches you, we anticipate having our new ambulance in service; we currently use an 8-9 year replacement cycle based on our activity level. Technological and environmental improvements benefit both our staff and the patients we provide treatment for.

Medical protocols issued by the State, guide the treatment our patients receive in the prehospital setting. Yearly, skills and/or medications used by ambulance personnel are reviewed and updated to improve patient care. We are considered a health care provider and our ambulance is licensed by the State. We receive a comprehensive, annual inspection by the Department of Public Health each year.

Our EMS Service Zone Plan was completed as a cooperative effort along with other Cape departments. This plan was mandated by the State to identify resources and coordinate various aspects of EMS care. We recently joined the State's Ambulance Task Force; as a participant, we help to insure an adequate EMS response to large incidents both on and off Cape.

#### FIRE PREVENTION & PUBLIC SAFETY EDUCATION

We continue to encourage residents to install and/or maintain their smoke and carbon monoxide (CO) detectors. Legislation passed two years ago, requires homes to have CO detectors on each habitable level and within ten feet of bedroom doors. Periodically, we respond to CO detector activations and find, in some instances, a discharge of CO in the home. Because CO is poisonous and undetectable by humans, working CO detectors are essential in any home using fossil fuels (gas, oil, coal, wood, etc.) Whenever a home is sold, an inspection and certificate from the fire department is required before the sale can become final. Landlords are required to provide CO detection for rental properties. Please contact us if you have questions or need further information.

Copies of the "Cape Cod Emergency Preparedness Handbook" are still available at the fire station; the handbook contains important safety information for your family. If you have questions regarding fire prevention, code compliance, or inspection issues, please contact Captain David Pierce or Chief Paul Frazier.

#### PERSONNEL

We continue to employ full and part time (call) personnel to provide EMS, fire suppression and other services, 24 hours a day. Our personnel are cross trained to perform both EMS and firefighting duties. Our staff is trained and experienced in managing a variety of emergency situations. Our full time firefighting staff level remains at ten. Eight full time personnel, working in shifts of two, staff the station 24 hours a day providing our core coverage. Two fulltime personnel work during the day, on an alternating basis, providing a third person when we are the busiest and when most personnel are less available. We continue to have Call Firefighters provide some additional daytime coverage which affords them an opportunity for added experience.

Our current operational strategy offers a prompt initial response by full time personnel with support from off duty full time and call personnel supplying additional help as needed. When possible, we retain some of the personnel who respond for standby should a subsequent incident occur while those involved in the initial response are committed. Our available resources can be taxed based on the severity and duration of an incident or the need to respond to additional requests for assistance. We utilize mutual aid from other departments as necessary; thus far, the system has been reliable. We are aware however, that the system is subject to periods of high activity, vehicles out of service and other factors that influence the availability of help outside of our District.

As we continually report, maintaining an adequate roster of call firefighters is challenging. Part time personnel often leave as opportunities for full time positions become available in surrounding communities. In recent years, we've experienced a decreasing number of qualified applicants applying for positions. We are aware that our call firefighters have personal, work and other commitments in addition to their obligations with the department. These issues have become the norm and we do not anticipate any improvement in future years.

Most incidents require us to "call back" additional staff and our off duty full time and call personnel are summoned. The fire service is somewhat unique in that personnel often respond to staff emergency incidents in addition to their scheduled weekly hours. Active periods require more call back resulting in necessary overtime expenses. Our current policy is to maintain a minimum of three firefighters during the day and two at night which necessitates the need to cover personnel who are on vacation, out sick or on other approved time off.

During the year, Call Firefighter Gus Riley left the department after two years of service for a full time position with the COMM Fire Dept. Gus was dedicated, enthusiastic and

mechanically talented. Call Firefighter Patrick Fontaine, who has been with the department since 2002, left for a full time position with the Yarmouth Fire Dept. Patrick was also a dedicated individual and we benefited from his experience working both in the hospital and with a private ambulance service. We will miss the important contributions both Gus and Patrick made during their time with us.

Two new call firefighters were hired during the year. Ty Anderson, who already had received EMT training and Brian Florence; both are from Cotuit. Both attended Firefighter I-II training at the Barnstable Fire Academy and began orientation with the department. It takes about two years for new call firefighters to reach an adequate level of skill and to become comfortable with operating at most incidents.

#### TRAINING

This past year, all department personnel have received various levels of training as required by the Department of Homeland Security. The National Incident Management System (NIMS) was implemented to allow responders from multiple agencies better respond to natural disasters and emergencies, including acts of terrorism. NIMS uses standard terminology and concepts for incident management.

Firefighter-Paramedic John Amento successfully completed training at the Massachusetts Firefighting Academy. FF Amento attended training with over 70 other recruits from Massachusetts in a rigorous, 12 week training program designed to give firefighters a broad base of skills in many areas of fire and rescue practices. This training is required of new full time personnel.

We continue to train on a regular basis in all areas of fire, rescue and EMS. Each year, we build upon existing skills and introduce new ones. Some personnel attend courses at the Mass Fire Academy in Stow, the Barnstable Fire Academy in Hyannis and the National Fire Academy in Maryland. Training activities also include preparing new Call Firefighters to function in their positions. State and federal laws mandate the periodic review of material such as responding to hazardous materials incidents, incident command and certain EMS related training. The recertification of all personnel at their respective levels of EMS training is ongoing through various mandatory and elective courses.

## APPARATUS AND EQUIPMENT

We keep our apparatus in a state of readiness by performing preventive and other maintenance. The frequency of repair for our two fire engines, now over 13 and 17 years of age, is increasing. Each year, we review our expenses and adjust our budget accordingly. The realistic service life of our fire engines are less than we anticipated when they were first purchased. For example, similar to other departments in the area, we are seeing body and frame corrosion due to chemicals used to manage ice and snow. We

anticipate updating our capital expense plan to reflect a somewhat earlier replacement schedule.

Since issuing portable radios to our personnel two years ago, we have improved the consistency of our communications. Though we still use a low band frequency for some paging, we are looking at the possibility of using a different frequency band to replace our pagers, some of which are over 20 years old. We are still working with the COMM Fire Department on a joint grant to provide a back up system capable of use during times when the State maintained system may be out of service or during catastrophic events such as a hurricane or similar event.

#### **BUILDING AND GROUNDS**

We have completed some projects on our facility during this past year; it's been over 17 years since renovations were completed; half of the original structure was built in 1938. We continue to work at completing repairs or improvements on a priority basis and within our ability to schedule contractors and oversee the work. This year we finished repairs to the HVAC system, painted the apparatus rooms, and made other repairs and improvement to the facility. We want to thank Firefighters McNamara, Lyons, VanEtten and others for the outside improvements they completed which saved us from hiring landscape contractors.

#### **ACTIVITIES**

As in the past, we participated in Kids Day sponsored by the Barnstable Police Department and Christmas in Cotuit. The Cotuit Firefighter's Association provides assistance to the Civic Association for the annual July 4 parade. District elections are held at the station each May.

The department sponsored Senior Private Jayne Pierce to attend training and became a Certified Car Seat Technician. As the result of this training, we can offer car seat inspections to insure your child's seat is properly installed as well as verify that your seat meets standards of safety necessary to protect your child. During the year, we have performed thirty car seat installations and assisted a number of parents with general information. We are surprised at how many car seats are not installed properly despite the best intentions of parents who follow the manufacturer's instructions. We plan to send another member the next time a training opportunity becomes available.

We continued this year to accept "sharps" – needles, syringes and lancets used by medical patients in home care situations. Sharps must not be disposed of in household trash and are not accepted at household hazardous waste collections. Participation in the program is FREE to residents who can bring full containers to the fire station for disposal and receive empty containers for personal use. This program is sponsored by the

department, in cooperation with the Barnstable County Hazardous Materials Program and Cape Cod Healthcare as a community service.

The department's call volume increased slightly this past year. Changes in activity levels are not uncommon; we look at trends that take place over several years to gain a perspective on any significant patterns of change. Fluctuations are based on factors that we can not reasonably predict. At the time of this writing, work has begun on a 128 lot subdivision north of Falmouth Road (Route 28) near the town line with Mashpee. It is too early to tell the extent of impact these additional homes will have on our requests for service.

We are pleased to continue providing blood pressure screening at the station. Hundreds of people have taken advantage of this free service offered anytime at the fire station, and at the Post Office the first Saturday of each month. We continue to offer information, advice on safety issues, and assistance in a variety of ways to our residents and visitors. Residents are always encouraged to drop by the station or call 428-2210 with questions, suggestions, or concerns.

#### COMMENTS

Our response during the day has improved with the addition of the second day position added last year. We review our operations to evaluate what, if any changes may be necessary to maintain our level of service. The fire service continually takes on new responsibilities in response to local, state or national trends.

We want to acknowledge the dedication and professionalism of our full and part time staff who work together so well. A listing of fire department members as of June 30, 2007 is provided after the narrative portion of this report. We offer our appreciation and thanks to these members of your fire and rescue department for their ongoing efforts to protect and serve our community

We thank the Prudential Committee, Treasurer, Clerk, Board of Water Commissioners and the employees of the Water Department for their continued cooperation and support.

#### PUBLIC SAFETY INFORMATION

Please consider taking action to make your family safer. . .

• Install carbon monoxide (CO) detectors in your home!

State law requires CO detectors in every home. Detectors must be installed within 10 feet of each bedroom door and on each habitable level; all must have battery back up. We recommend locating a detector in unfinished basements as well. Contact us for additional information.

Install and maintain smoke detectors throughout your home!

Test your smoke detectors regularly and replace them every 10 years (or less), even if they appear to work properly. Environmental exposure to dust and moisture can reduce a detector's effectiveness. We can test your detector's operation free of charge.

Take advantage of our "File for Life" program!

In you need to call our ambulance service, having current medical information available helps us to provide better care. Our "File for Life" program allows you to keep medical information available in a red pouch affixed to your refrigerator with a magnetic backing; these are available free at the fire station.

· Please post your house number!

Town regulations require the use of house numbers. If your number can't be seen from the street, a sign must be placed near the driveway or road entrance. Trim any foliage that might obstruct your number from view. If you have detached structures, such as a guest cottage or other habitable space on your property, a separate house number may be necessary. We can provide more specific information in accordance with the Town's house number regulations.

Maintain adequate access to your property!

Tree limbs and brush overhanging driveways on private roads can delay or prevent us from reaching your home quickly. Our fire apparatus is larger and wider than the average passenger vehicle and requires more overhead room; damage can occur when clearance is not sufficient. We can furnish information on how to provide adequate access to your property.

Install a lock box if you have a medical or fire alarm!

If you have a fire and/or medical alarm, live alone or live away part of the year, you may want to consider using a "lock box". Lock boxes securely store keys to your property for responders to use in an emergency. Information is available at the fire station. Residents with fire and/or medical alarms are requested to update contact and other information.
